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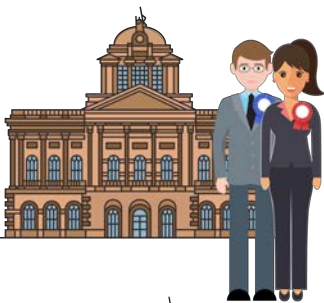
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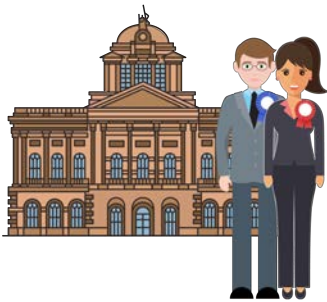
Introduction



There are local elections in England and Northern Ireland on Thursday May 2nd.



There are no local elections in Wales or Scotland this year.



You have a chance to vote for someone to be your local councillor.



Not about Brexit

The local elections should not be about Brexit.



Local councillors can't do anything about Brexit.



It's about your local services

Your local councillor has a say about many of the services for people with learning disabilities.



Your local councillor will help the council to decide:

- How much money is spent on social care. This is the money that pays for people's support at home



- How much money goes to services for people with learning disabilities, like day centres, advocacy groups and clubs



- How much money is spent on services like parks, libraries and sports centres



- What new buildings are built



- What to do about roads, pavements and buses



- How much you have to pay in Council Tax

Your local councillor



Your local councillor speaks up for your local area on your local council.



Your local council may be:

- A County Council - for your whole county



- A Local Council - for your area (City, Borough or District)



- A Town Council - for your town



It might be for an area which isn't a county and isn't a city.



Your local councillor isn't paid a wage.
They get an allowance to cover the costs of going to meetings.



When you vote, you are choosing the person you want to be your local councillor.



Almost all councillors belong to a political party.

Your local council



Your local council pays for many of the services that people with learning disabilities need.



Sometimes the council runs the services.



Sometimes they pay a company or organisation to run the services.



The council can decide what services are needed and where the services should be.

Money

Your local council gets its money from:



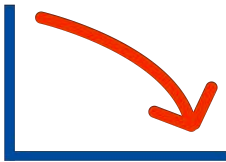
- Local people and businesses paying Council Tax



- The Government



- Other things like rent and charges



The amount of money that local councils have received from the Government has gone down a lot.



In 8 years, on average, councils have lost 60p out of every £1 that they used to get from the Government.



Many people think that this has caused the closure of local services.
