Transition Event Brings Professionals Together

Last month, our Early Years team were busy hosting our Transition Event for professionals to share vital information about children moving from nursery to primary school in September.

The event offered space and time to talk freely about the developmental needs and interests of the children who may be transitioning to different nurseries or starting reception class.

Over 90 schools and settings attended the Transition Event with over 120 professionals dedicating their time to ensure successful transitions. The Early Years SEND team were also on hand to discuss the enhanced transitions for children with SEND to make sure every child in Sefton has a great experience on the next stage of their educational adventure!

New Guidance: Protective security and preparedness for education settings

This non-statutory guidance provides advice to help educational settings be better prepared and able to respond to terrorism and other major incidents. It sets out practical steps to keep learners, staff and volunteers safe in the event of an incident through simple and costeffective methods.

EYFS Profile Assessment

The Department for Education (DfE) has released a publication to help guide teachers in completing the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Profile assessment. This profile must be completed for each child in the final term of the academic year in which they turn 5.

While the EYFS Profile is usually completed by reception teachers, in some cases, other early years settings may need to carry out the assessment if it's not being done in the reception year. For the purpose of this document, 'teacher' refers to any early years practitioner, including childminders, who is working with the child and completing the EYFS Profile.

If you have a child in your school or setting who did not attend reception provision in Autumn 2024 and will be moving straight into Year One in Autumn 2025, and you have not yet completed the EYFS Profile, please reach out to Louise Cheetham at <u>louise.cheetham@sefton.gov.uk</u>.

Please note that EYFSP data must be submitted to the Local Authority by Friday 20th June 2025 5pm.

Consultation on Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) Floor Space Requirements

The Department for Education (DfE) has launched a consultation on the current EYFS floor space requirements, which could have a significant impact on early years settings. Currently, providers must meet specific indoor space requirements per child, depending on age. However, the DfE is seeking feedback on whether 'free-flow' outdoor areas should be included in these space measurements for children aged two and above.

The consultation presents two options for how this could work, one with no cap on the number of children and one with a cap to prevent overcrowding. The government's preferred option is the latter.

This is a valuable opportunity for early years providers to have their say on potential changes. The consultation is open until 11 July 2025, and the DfE is expected to share their response by autumn 2025.

Working Together: Old Roan Nursery Expands with New Space to Support Growing Local Demand

Sefton Council were celebrating the continued success and expansion of Old Roan Pre School Nursery in Aintree last month which has now launched a brand-new space to create 12 new places for 0–2-year-olds. The nursery, which first opened in 2018 following the transformation of two unused classrooms at the back of Aintree community centre, was created to meet growing demand for early years provision in the area and generate vital income to support the adjoining community space.

Seven years on, Old Roan Nursery is thriving because of the passion and commitment from two local women and owners Julie Currie and Vicky Finley and staff at the pre school nursery. Support from early years funding has helped toward the cost.

Leader of Sefton Council, Cllr Marion Atkinson praised the success of the project: "This is a fantastic example of what can be achieved when we invest in our communities and support early years development. Old Roan Nursery was born out of a clear local need, and not only has it gone from strength to strength, but it's also helped sustain a much-loved community facility."

"I'm incredibly proud to see this new space open and to know it will make a real difference to families in Aintree and beyond."

Bronze, Silver and Gold: Trauma and Attachment Awards in Sefton

And so, the journey continues... It's hard to believe we're about to embark on the fifth year of running the Attachment and Trauma Sensitive Setting Award with schools and PVI settings. Since starting in 2020 a total of 38 schools and settings have completed, or are in the process of completing the Bronze level award with many going onto to achieve the Silver and Gold award.

A key requirement of the award is that the whole school/setting community accesses a comprehensive training package and as a result we estimate that approximately 1,000 early years educators in Sefton have accessed the excellent training delivered by Dr Jenny Nock. Not only is this approach a valuable CPD opportunity but it also ensures that practice and support is consistent when supporting children and their families.



As an Early Years Team we are in the process of developing an Attachment and Trauma Aware pathway of training and support. The pathway will include a range of training courses and resources which will aim to provide underpinning knowledge and understanding around the importance of:

- Attachment and loving relationships
- Early Brain Development
- ACE's and Trauma
- Self Regulation
- Staff Wellbeing
